Shihan Fumio Demura, age 82, of Santa Ana, CA passed away April 24, 2023, surrounded by his family, friends, and students.

He is survived by his sister Kinue and his nephew Sean, of Santa Ana, CA. He is also survived by his siblings Teruo, Yukio, Mitsue and Nobuo in Japan. He was predeceased by his parents.

Shihan Demura is the founder of Shito-Ryu Genbu-Kai. He was a highly respected world-renowned karate-do, kobudo, and batto-do instructor. He was a mentor and friend to many across the world.

Shihan Demura was born on September 15, 1940, in Yokohama, Japan. At the age of 9, he began training in karate and kendo under Asano Sensei. At the age of 12, he started training under Ryusho Sakagami in Itosu-kai karate. He received his 1st dan black belt in 1956. Shihan Demura's reputation as a martial arts champion was secured in 1961, when he won the All-Japan Karate Freestyle Tournament, and was rated as one of Japan's top eight competitors for the next three years. His many tournament wins include the East Japan Championship, the Shito-Ryu Annual Championship, and the Kanto District Championship. In 1959, while at Nihon University in Tokyo, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics, Shihan Demura developed a special interest in kobudo, including the use of weapons (bo, nunchaku, kama, sai, eku bo, tonfa) under the direction of Taira Shinken. Shihan Demura met martial arts scholar Donn Draeger, who introduced him to Dan Ivan. Mr. Ivan helped bring Shihan Demura to the United States in 1965 as a karate instructor of Shito-Ryu Karate and Okinawan Kobudo. Shihan Demura performed karate demonstrations at the Japanese Village & Deer Park for many years. He was featured on the cover of Black Belt Magazine nine times. He authored numerous karate and kobudo books, magazine articles, and DVD's. He was inducted into the Martial Arts History Museum Hall of Fame in 1999, and received Black Belt Magazine's Hall of Fame twice and Black Belt Magazines Lifetime Achievement Award.

In the 1980's, Shihan Demura became involved in the Karate Kid series of films. He was the stunt double for Pat Morita, who played Mr. Miyagi. The Karate Kid screenwriter Robert Mark Kamen stated that Mr. Miyagi was named after Chōjun Miyagi, the founder of the Gojuryu karate style, and that Shihan Demura was one of the inspirations for the character. Shihan Demura was also the subject of the 2015 documentary The Real Miyagi. He appeared in several films and documentaries, including: The Warrior Within, The Island of Dr. Moreau, The Karate Kid movies, Rising Sun, Mortal Kombat, and many others. He was also technical advisor for several movies including a soon to be released series "Shogun".

Shihan Demura received the All-Japan Karate Federation President's Trophy for outstanding tournament play and was awarded certificates of recognition from Japanese Cabinet officials for his contributions to the art of karate. He was captain of the U.S. Japan Goodwill Championships of 1972 and a member of the Amateur Athletic Union national technical committee. He was on the board of directors of the International Martial Arts Federation, chairman and president of the Japan Karate Federation International, and chief instructor and president of Shito-Ryu Karate-Do Genbu-Kai International. In 2019, he was presented with the Foreign Minister's Commendation from the Consul General of Japan for his outstanding achievements. Shihan Demura was presented the rank of 10th dan in 2022.

Shihan Demura was a real karate Sensei. He was loved by many martial arts practitioners, particularly his students. He exemplified the true meaning of being a karateka, as he traveled throughout the world teaching and sharing his knowledge. He was down to earth and loved to spend time with family, martial artists, and friends. He brought smiles to people's faces with his gift of origami creations. One of his favorite pastimes was fishing.

Shihan Demura was an incredible human being and made a great impact on millions of people around the world throughout his lifetime. He will be dearly missed by all.

Shihan Bernard Edwards, Branch Chief and President of Ryukyu Kobujutsu Hozon Shinko Kai, USA, Shihan Edwards is under the direction of Hanshi Kisho Inoue. Mr. Kisho Inoue is President of Ryukyu Kobujutsu Hozon Shinko Kai General Headquarters in Tokyo, Japan and Internationally.

Shihan Edwards is also the Chief Master Instructor of Hakua Kai Karate Do USA. The President and Founder of Edwards Karate School. The school has been teaching traditional Japanese Hakua Kai Karate-Do to adults and children in the San Francisco Peninsula area and throughout the United States and other countries for the last 54 years.

For his contribution to the traditional Japanese martial arts, Shihan Edwards was inducted into the Martial Arts Masters Hall of Fame in 2010, the Hokka Nichibeikai Bunka Hall of Fame in 2016, and the Bay Area Cities Karate and Kobudo Alliance Masters Hall of Fame in 2017. The Martial Arts Masters Hall of Fame recognizes the martial arts community leaders. The Bunka Hall of Fame is to honor those who have excelled and contributed to the culture of Japan and better relationships in our community by enlightening all to the culture of Japan as practiced here in America.

Demura Shihan knew both the late Mr. Gansho Inoue and Katsushi Iwabuchi and Kisho Inoue the son of Gansho Inoue, my direct teacher. Mr. Edwards Shihan has spent many years of Kobudo studies under Shihan Fumio Demura as well. Beside his studies of Kobudo Shihan Edwards has discipline in a few other Martial Arts. Jo Justu until present (member of Nihon JodoKai), 12 years study of laido, Karate Do, and Aikido.

SENSEI KEN NISHIKI

Sensei Ken Nishiki was born on April 2, 1969 in Tokyo, Japan. At the age of 5 (1974), he began training with the Japan Karate Association. He competed and won many tournaments through his Junior and High School years. He is a graduate of Kokushikan University. In 1991 he won First Place in the Kanto University Championships. Soon after, he came to the US in 1992 and for about three years, he lived in the original Genbu Kai' Hombu Dojo on Bristol Street, Santa Ana, California where he trained and greatly influenced many students with his enthusiasm, energy and vast techniques. He returned to Japan in 1995 and continue to hone and develop his skills in various martial arts not just karate but also an expert with kobudo, batto-do, kendo and judo.

Notable mention is his influence for starting karate training was the late Shihan Fumio Demura. His father and Shihan Demura was best friends, which make him a nephew and a member of the Genbu Kai family. He continue to be the Japan liaison for Genbu Kai and Rengo Kai. Direct all questions to the Tournament Director, Sensei Roy Center. Please note these rules and guidelines may be amended during the competition at the discretion of Tournament Officials (i.e., combining or adjusting divisions)

REGISTRATION

- 1. Online payment can be made by accessing Genbu Kai website
 - a. www.genbukai.org
- 2. Early Registration (Ends 2/23/2024):
 - a. \$75 for first two divisions and \$10 for each additional division
 - b. Team Divisions \$45 per team, per division
- 3. Online registration ends Friday, 2/23/2024
 - Discount rate is available for online and early registration only
- 4. Same Day In Person Registration Ends at 9:00 am on Tournament Day
 - a. \$95 for first two divisions and \$20 for each additional division
 - b. Teams Divions \$60 per team, per division

COACHING PASSES

- 1. Passes will be available for \$30. Coaches must wear a tracksuit or gi
- 2. Judges and Referees are not allowed to be a coach when not officiating
- 3. One coach per competitor will be allowed ringside. Behavior must be professional
- 4. Poor behavior will result in the coach being removed from the ring at officials' discretion, and the coach's pass will be revoked without refund

JUDGES & REFEREES

- 1. 1 Head Judge and 4 Corner Referees
- 2. Attire should include:
 - a. Navy Blue Jacket
 - b. Gray Slacks,
 - c. White Shirt
 - d. Black Shoes with Rubber Soles (no wood/metal soles),
 - e. Appropriate Referee Tie
- 3. Judges and Referees are to be impartial and should not be coaching when not officiating

ETIQUETE

- 1. Karate competitors must wear clean white gi
- 2. Respect one another and demonstrate good sportsmanship
- 3. Arrive early and check in
- 4. Spectator seating are available on bleachers. Please stay clear from walking aisle and ring side

COMPETITORS

- 1. Karate Competitors are only allowed to enter one division for each of the following:
 - a. Individual kata
 - b. Individual kumite
 - c. Synchronized team kata
- 2. Kobudo Competitors are only allowed to enter one division for each of the following:
 - a. Long weapon kata
 - b. Short weapon kata
 - c. Kobudo kumite
 - d. Synchronized kobudo team kata
- 3. If a competitor participates in both kata and kumite, both divisions must be for the same
- 4. Competitors may only compete as a Junior or Adult not both
- 5. Demura-Ha Shito-Ryu Karate-Do Genbu-Kai reserves the right to refuse participation to any individual
- 6. It is the competitor's responsibility to arrive at the start of the tournament and be present for division staging (No refunds will be given for missed competition)

DIVISIONS

- 1. Divisions are determined by years of training, not belt color
- 2. Order and composition of divisions may change at the discretion of Tournament Officials
- 3. A minimum of three (3) competitors are required for a division to compete. If there are less than three competitors, the division may be combined with another division

EXPERIENCE CATEGORIES

- 1. Beginner
 - ❖ 8th Kyu & under (less than 1 year of training)
- 2. Novice
 - ❖ 7th Kyu to 5th Kyu (1 to 2 years of training)
- 3. Intermediate

 - 4th Kyu to 2nd Kyu (2+ to 4 years of training)
 4th to 2nd Kyu must compete in Intermediate Divisions or higher

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- 4. Advanced
 - ❖ 1st Kyu & higher (4+ years of training)
 - ❖ 1st Kyu and Black Belts must compete in Advanced Divisions or Elite. An athlete who participates in an Elite Division may compete in an Advanced Division in another category.

AWARDS

- 1. Kata Awards for first, second, and third place
- 2. Kumite Awards for first, second, and two (2) third place competitors
- 3. Team kata Awards for first, second, and third place

KUMITE

- 1. The sparring divisions will utilize <u>modified</u> USANKF rules. Tournament Officials retain the right to make adjustments as needed to maintain a safe and efficient event.
- 2. All Kumite divisions are Jiyu Kumite Free Sparring
- 3. Gloves and a mouthpiece are mandatory for all competitors
- 4. Groin protectors are mandatory for all male competitors
- 5. Shin, chest, and head protection are recommended
- 6. Atoshi-Baraku ("little time left") at fifteen (15) seconds left on the clock
- 7. Ties will be decided based on the following criteria in the order below:
 - a. Senchu (first opponent to have scored an unopposed point will win)
 - b. The competitor with the most Ippon wins
 - c. The competitor with the most Waza Ari wins
 - d. If still tied after the above considerations, the match will be decided with a vote from the Judge and Referees
- The 10 Second Rule will only be applied in Advanced and Elite divisions

DIVISIONS - CATEGORIES

- 1. Kobudo Competitors are only allowed to enter ONE division for each of the following categories:
 - a. Long Weapon: Bo, Eku, Jo
 - b. Short Weapon: Sai, Tonfa, Maei-Te Tonfa, Nunchaku (single or double), Kama, Tekko
 - c. Synchronized Team Kata
 - d. Kobudo Kumite Weapon Sparring
- 2. If a competitor participates in both kata and kumite, both divisions must be for the same age/rank
- 3. Competitors may only compete as a Junior or Adult not both
- 4. Tournament Officials reserves the right to refuse participation to any individual

KATA

- 1. Competitors may enter one long weapon kata division, one short weapon kata division, and one team kata division
- 2. All kata divisions are mixed male and female
- 3. The weapon cannot make contact with the floor at any time
- 4. Maintain control of the weapon at all times
- 5. Each weapon must be inspected prior to the start of the division
- 6. Kobudo divisions will be based on competitors' karate ranks and length of training
- 7. Judges will use a point system
- 8. Kata Selection:
 - a. Demura-Ha Kobudo Kihon Katas
 - b. Traditional Kobudo Katas are allowed
 - c. FOR QUESTIONS REGARDING ACCEPTABLE KATAS, INQUIRE WITH TOURNAMENT DIRECTORS

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KUMITE

- 1. Kobudo Kumite (weapons sparring) is a relatively new development and is rapidly gaining popularity. Its main purpose is the application of vigorous techniques as practiced in kobudo kihon and katas.
- 2. Ring Setup
 - a. Competition floor –same as karate kumite rings 8 Meters Square
 - b. Officials each ring will consist of 1 Judge and 4 Corner Referees
 - c. Score Table each ring will have a minimum of 1 scorekeeper, 1 timekeeper, and 2 helpers
 - d. Equipment
 - a. Two sets of each of the following Kobudo Kumite weapons:
 - Bo, Eku, Sai, Tonfa, Kama, Nunchaku, Katana, Tinbe
 - b. Protective gear
 - 1. Head gear
 - 2. Towels / bandana for wearing under the helmet
 - 3. Gloves
 - c. Competitors are encouraged to bring their own helmet and gloves
 - 4. Provide towels / bandana to wear under helmet
 - 5. Color must be neutral or match your appointed side of the ring (i.e., aka/shiro/ao)
 - 6. Equipment must be approved by officials
 - 7. Groin protection required for males
 - 8. Optional gear competitors may bring shin, arm, and chest protection
- 3. Competitors will choose a weapon prior to each match and return it at the end of the match
- 4. Kobudo Kumite techniques shall be executed with proper distance, speed, timing, and power, while remaining under control, with safety and a display of good sportsmanship at all times
- 5. Scoring Techniques / Targets:
 - a. Tsuki Thrust to the chest/body (throat is prohibited)
 - b. Men Top of forehead (crown)
 - 9. Migi Men Right side of the head above the temple
 - 10. Hidari Men Left side of the head above the temple
 - c. Do The body
 - 1. Migi Do Right side of the body
 - 2. Hidari Do Left side of the body
 - d. Kote The wrist
 - 1. Migi Kote Right wrist and lower 1/3 of attached forearm
 - 2. Hidari Kote Left wrist and lower 1/3 of attached forearm
 - e. Ashi Leg (Only from ankle to below the knee This target will be only ½ point)
 - 1. Migi Ashi Right leg, only from ankle to below the knee
 - 2. Hidari Ashi Left leg, only from ankle to below the knee

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- 6. Illegal / Prohibited Actions
 - a. Jogai Stepping out of bound
 - b. Excessive contact
 - c. Grabbing the opponent
 - d. Grabbing the opponent's weapon
 - e. Uncontrollable techniques
 - f. Using the non-protected or padded parts of the weapon to strike
 - g. Kicking or punching with an empty hand
 - h. Malicious intent purposely causing harm to an opponent
 - i. Non-Scoring and Prohibited Targets / Techniques:
 - 3. Top and back of the head
 - 4. The temples

 - 5. The ears6. The joints
 - 7. The throat
 - 8. The groin
 - 9. The neck
 - 10. The thighs

7. Penalties

- a. All penalties including contact, non-contact, out of bound, etc., will be logged under a single category

Please carefully review these rules and guidelines

REGISTRATION

- 1. Online payment can be made by accessing Genbu Kai website

- 2. Early Registration (Ends 2/23/2024):
 - a. \$75 for first two divisions and \$10 for each additional division
 - b. Team Divisions \$45 per team, per division
- 3. Online registration ends Friday, 2/23/2024

- 4. Same Day In Person Registration Ends at 9:00 am on Tournament Day
 - a. \$95 for first two divisions and \$20 for each additional division

GENERAL RULES

- 1. These rules and all divisions are subject to change at the discretion of the Tournament Director or the Board of Directors. If you have any questions, please contact the Tournament Director, Sensei Jim Otter
- 2. Division numbers may change. See competition application.
- 3. Any unsafe action is cause for disqualification with no refund
- 4. Possession of or any indication of the use of alcohol or drugs will not be tolerated and will result in immediate expulsion with no refund
- 5. Any dangerous or belligerent behavior will not be tolerated and will result in immediate expulsion with no refund
- 6. No flash photography allowed. Video filming only with the authorization of the Tournament Director

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COMPETITORS

- 1. Mu-Dansha (non-Black Belt) competitors may <u>not</u> use a live (sharp) blade in kata competition unless approved by the Tournament Director. (No wakizashi allowed)
- 2. All swords, both sharpened (shinken) and unsharpened (iaito), must be inspected and tagged by Tai Kai officials. The following may be reasons for failing inspection other reasons may apply at the discretion of officials:
 - Loose chips in edge of blade
 - Cracked or bent blade
 - Loose or defective nakago or tsuba
 - Loose or missing tsuka-ito
 - Cracked or defective koiguchi
 - Excessively cracked saya
 - Loose or missing mekugi
 - All swords to be a minimum of 24 inches all katana wakisashi for cutting
- 3. All competitors must remain quiet and respectful at all times. Avoid any movement or distraction while someone is cutting or performing a kata. There will be no loud talking, laughing or improper behavior inside the building. Flash photography or video recording that are distracting in any way are not be allowed unless authorized by the Tournament Officials.
- 4. For safety, please be aware of your surrounding if practicing inside. Otherwise go outside and observe all safety precautions.
- 5. Any unsafe action, improper use of a sword, fooling around, or causing potential harm to others will be cause for immediate expulsion from the competition. No entry or spectator fee will be refunded.
- 6. This is a Japanese style tournament. For some cutting divisions, single elimination rules will be followed. While this may seem harsh, it is the only way to put the competition in the proper perspective of Japanese Swordsmanship. When two opponents face each other in battle, only one moves on to the next fight.
- 7. All competitors must wear hakama (Japanese pants) and kimono top or gi top (color is optional). Junior and beginner students should wear hakama but may ask permission of the Tournament Director to wear a karate gi if they do not own a hakama.
- 8. All competitors must either have bare feet or wear Tabi (Japanese socks). The color may be white, dark blue or black. No rubber soles.



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DIVISIONS

Kata Competition – ONLY ONE INDIVIDUAL KATA DIVISION ALLOWED PER COMPETITOR

- 1. Sharpen or live blades are not allowed for use in Kata for anyone below the rank of Sho-Dan (in Batto-Do) without special approval of the Tournament Director. (All swords to be a minimum of 24 inches.)
- 2. Each competitor must perform three (3) kata:
 - a) Batto-Do Black Belts (Yudansha) must select from the eight (8) Toyama-Ryu or eight (8) Suishin Ryu katas, but may not mix Toyama -Ryu and Suishin Ryu katas
 - b) Batto-Do Kyu level competitors may select from the eight (8) Toyama-Ryu or eight (8) Kome katas, but may not mix Toyama-Ryu and Kome katas.
 - c) Other styles may present katas in a written request for approval by the Tournament Director no approval is guaranteed.
- 3. Ties will be decided Judges votes with flags. The side with the with majority of the same color flags win
- 4. All competitors will line up and bow together as a group. After group bow, each competitors bows before announcing their kata and bows again when finished
- 5. Awards will be given for first, second, and third place
- 6. TEAM KATA teams will be comprised of three persons at the end of the competition, and will perform three katas, and all three katas must come from only one of these three groups: Kome, Toyama Ryu, or Suishin-Ryu

TAMESHIGIRI – INDIVIDUAL CUTTING COMPETITION

- 1. Must be eighteen years or older
- 2. Competitors must be adult Black Belts (18 years and older) unless approved by their instructor and the Tournament Director.
- 3. See diagrams attached for the cuts required for each level of competition.
- 4. The sequence of cuts may be started from the right or left side.
- 5. Competitors will be paired for elimination style competition, but the members of each pair will perform separately, then stand together and the winner of each pair will be chosen using flags.
- 6. Cutting will be judged by traditional standards, 45 degrees for Kesa-Giri and Gyaku-Kesa-Giri, for Suihei-Giri (sideways cut).

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- 7. Where the cut piece falls is important.
- 8. The judges will base their decision on such aspects as performing the proper sequence of the cuts, cleanness of the cuts, and overall presentation. A perfect cut equals zero points. Points are taken off a competitors score according to the degree of the mistake made. The competitor with the least amount of points deducted from his score is deemed the winner and moves on to the next round. The following is an example of what the judges base their scores on:

A. -20 points:

- 1. Slightly rocking the cutting stand during the cut.
- 2. Small yama "mountain top" on the top of the wara. This is made when a cut is made through the previous cut.
- 3. Angle slightly off. A 40-45 degree angle is considered ideal.

B. -30 points

- 1. Rocking the cutting stand during the cut.
- 2. Yamanokoshi or "skin" left. Caused when the outer layer of tatami is not cut through properly and extends several inches above the angle of the cut.
- 3. Shakuri or scalloped cut. The result of poor blade angle during the cut.

C. -50 points

- 1. Angle of cut too deep. Much sharper than 45 degrees.
- 2. Angle of cut too shallow. Much less than 45 degrees.
- 3. Large yama.
- 4. Chip cut causing a spray of wara by slicing too thin a piece.
- 5. Knocking off the last piece of wara.
- 6. Incorrect or incomplete sequence of cuts.
- 7. Incomplete cut through the wara.

D. Disqualification

- 1. Hit the floor after cut.
- 2. Miss the wara completely.
- 3. Hitting the peg in the stand.
- 4. Knocking the stand over.
- 5. Bending the sword blade enough to prevent noto.
- 6. Injury to oneself or another person.
- 7. Touching the wara in any way other than a cut during performance of pattern being performed.
- 8. Cutting over forward leg
- 9. Cutting Pattern performed out of sequence, or wrong pattern

TEAM CUTTING COMPETITION

1. Scoring will be from 5.0 to 10.0 in increments of two tenths (Ex 5.4, 5.6, etc.)

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HAYA WAZA GIRI – CUTTING COMPETITION

- 1. Haya Waza Giri is competition using advanced cutting technique
- 2. Competitors will announce the cutting pattern they will perform
- 3. Competitors will compete individually and be judged by a panel of (3) judges.
- 4. Each competitor will cut a single wara only.
- 5. In the case of a tie, a second single wara will be cut.
- 6. There is a time element if a competitor takes more than approximately five (5) seconds to complete their cuts, the judges may choose to lower their scores
- 7. Attached are the patterns currently allowed.
 - a. A competitor may request consideration of another pattern, request to be made in writing to the Batto-Do Tournament Director, Sensei Jim Otter– there is no guarantee of approval.

DO-DAN CUTTING COMPETITION

- 1. The Do-Dan event is a single round competition based on the number of horizontally stacked targets that can be cut through with a single vertical cut.
- 2. The cut must be made at 90 degree angle to the targets. Whole and fractional targets will be counted. Three judges must agree on the amount of target cut.
- 3. Cuts that come out of the end of the stack of mats will be disqualified.
- 4. Cuts 20 degrees or more off true will have two (2) inches deducted from the length of the cut. This illustrates an angle of 20 degrees:



5. Each competitor may use their own sword, and should advance to the Do-Dan stand when directed by the judges.

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WAKIZASHI CUTTING COMPETITION

- 1. This cutting competition uses the Wakizashi blade (approximately 12 to 24 inches).
- 2. Competitors will compete individually.
- 3. To be judged on a scale of 6.0 to 9.0 by a panel of three (3) judges.
- 4. Each competitor will cut a single wara only.
- 5. In the case of a tie, a second single wara will be cut.
- 6. There is a time element if a competitor takes more than approximately five (5) seconds to complete their cuts, the judges may choose to lower their scores.
- 7. The cutting pattern to be used by all competitors is Roku-Dan-Giri

TEAM TAMESHIGIRI


- 1. Each team of three competitors will perform Roku-dan-giri on a single target per round.
- 2. Teams will be paired for elimination.
- 3. Each person will make two of the six cuts in the proper order.
- 4. The cuts may be started from the right or left but must continue in the proper sequence.
- 5. The same rules and criteria as in the other Tameshigiri cutting divisions apply to judging the cutting in the team division.





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TSUBAME GAESHI



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INAZUMA GIRI










Kasumi: Mist – Low Suihei (horizontal cut to the right) followed by high Suihei.




